2013 to 2018; Adjusted for Inflation

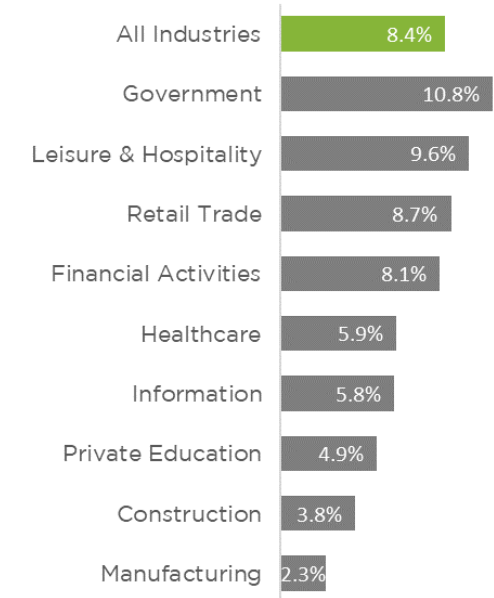

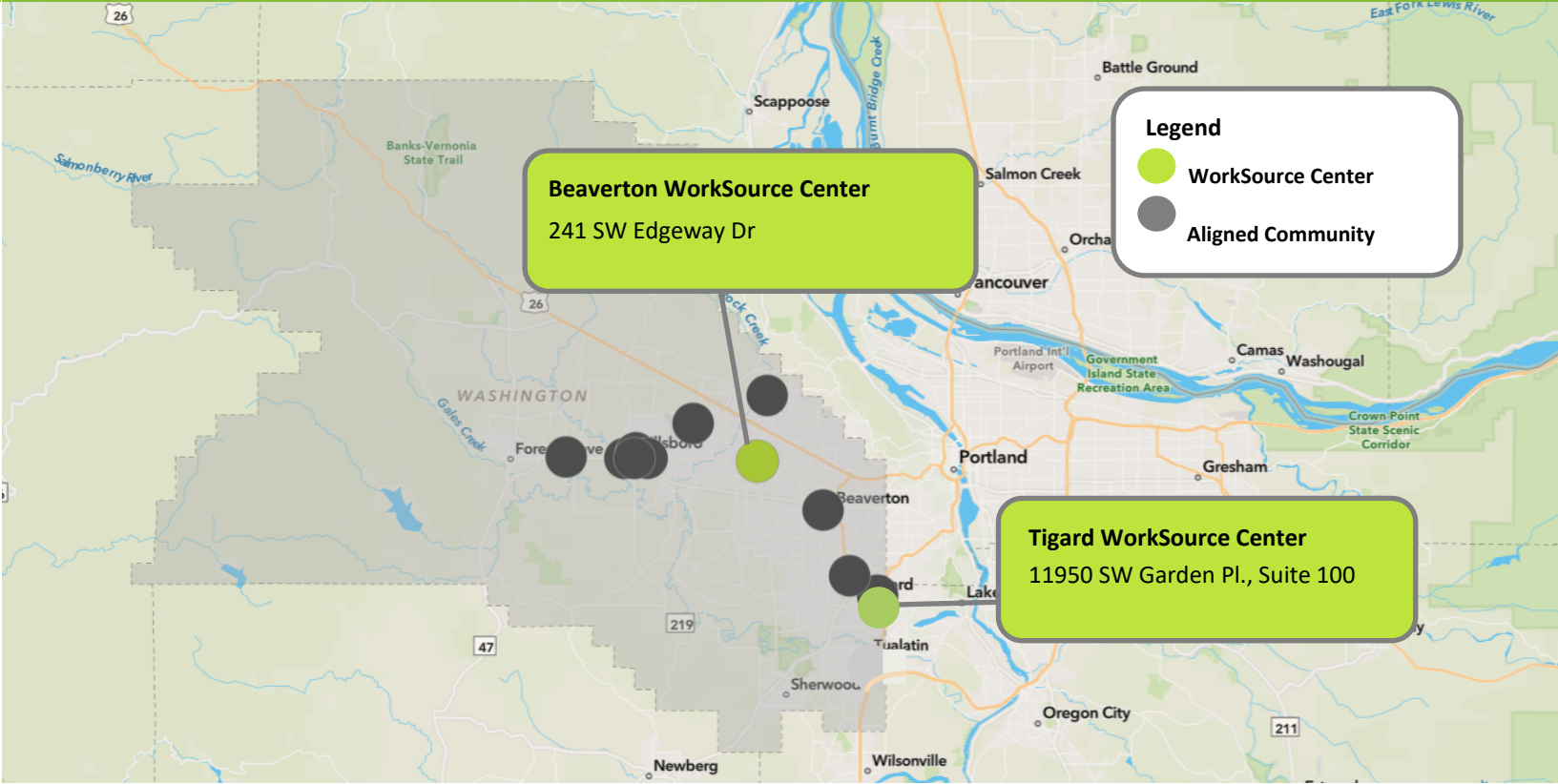

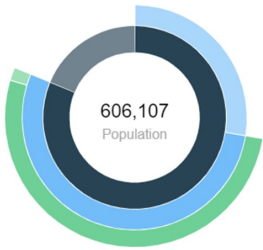

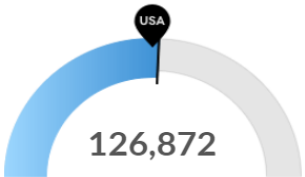

Figure 1: Population Characteristics, 2018

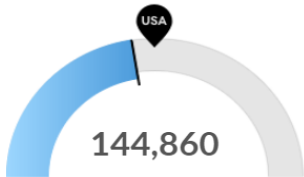

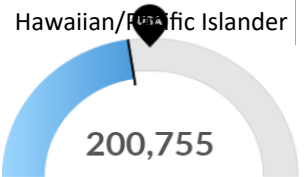
Millennials
