








Nominal wage and household income growth in Portland MSA 2001-2016







Share of households by self-sufficiency and poverty





Introducing a new standard

- ▶ 4th Iteration
- Dr. Diana Pierce University of Washington
- Self-sufficiency = no private or public assistance
- Making data-informed decisions for our region & state





Key difference: Budgets vary depending on age of household members, and 48 vs. 700











Graph C: Comparison of Earned Income





 - Metro Economic Value Atlas (EVA)



Share of households by income categories, Multnomah County




Above self-sufficiency


Share of households by income categories, Washington County
